- 4. You must have a cumulative GPA of at least 2.64/4.0, 2.80/4.3, 2.91/4.5, or 3.23/5, or, alternatively, a score of 80% or higher on a 100-point scale, or be ranked in the top 20% of your class
- 5. Be in good physical and mental health

Step 1: Understand the Scholarship

Finally, review the actual application form so that when you're ready to apply, you already know exactly what's required and can complete it smoothly.


Once you've got all the information in hand, the next thing is to check the timeline for how the application process actually works.

It's not just about applying; there's a whole journey from the announcement of the scholarship right up to the moment you land in Korea.

You need to know exactly what happens at each step and what you're supposed to do, one thing after another, so nothing catches you off guard.

Now let's look at the timeline overview of how the GKS application begins and moves through to the final selection.

- **Announcement Release** The official guidelines, university list, and application forms are released (usually in March for Graduate and September for Undergraduate).
- **Document Preparation** Gather and prepare all required documents according to the checklist.
- **Submission** Submit your documents through either the Embassy Track (to the Korean embassy in your country) or the University Track (directly to your chosen Korean university).
- First Round of Selection Conducted by the Korean embassy or the university.
- Second Round of Selection Reviewed by NIIED (National Institute for International Education).
- Third Round / Final Confirmation Final selection is made, and successful candidates receive their acceptance notice.
- **Visa Application and Pre-departure** Apply for a Korean student visa, arrange travel, and prepare for departure.
- **Arrival in Korea** Orientation, Korean language course (if applicable), and start of the academic programme.



While you prepare all the documents, you need to choose the track through which you will submit your application. You can apply either through the Embassy Track or the University Track.

Through the Embassy Track, you can apply to three Korean universities by sending all your documents to the Korean embassy in your country, which will handle the scholarship process.


In the University Track, you apply to only one specific Korean university by sending all your documents directly to that university in Korea.

Step 2: How to Apply for GKS

Start with official guidelines

The first thing you need to do is download the official GKS application guidelines. These are available as a PDF and include all the key details.

This one document will explain the full eligibility criteria, the required documents, the timeline, and even give you access to the official application forms.

It also includes a list of all the participating Korean universities and the majors they offer under this scholarship.

There are two choices to either choose University Track or Embassy Track for scholarship applications.

Choose an application

You can choose up to three universities under the embassy track, the chosen major should be consistent across the universities you list.

On the other hand, if you decide to apply through the university track, you can apply to only one university. You cannot apply through both tracks in the same year.

So once you choose your preferred track, you also decide how many universities you will be applying to. This step is critical, so take your time to research properly.

On the official NIIED website, <u>studyinkorea.go.kr</u>, you can download not only the application guidelines but also a separate file that contains the complete list of participating universities and their details.

3 Choosing Your University and Major

This file is provided in a zip folder, which, once extracted, gives you access to a spreadsheet.

The spreadsheet includes information about each university, the majors they offer, the language of instruction for those majors, and links to the respective departments.


By reviewing this file, you can explore and select the major that best suits your academic goals.

Once you have selected your Korean university and the major you intend to apply for, the next step is to begin working on your personal statement and study plan.

Both should be closely aligned with your chosen major, highlighting what you bring to the table as a candidate.

In your personal statement, you will present your past achievements, while in your study plan you will outline your future goals.

4 Write your Personal statement and Study plan

Together, these documents should demonstrate clearly why you are a strong candidate for the scholarship and what value you can contribute.

The process begins with understanding exactly what the GKS committee expects from these documents and how they should be presented.


While a format is already provided, along with the main points to address, transforming these into a genuine and compelling narrative is not straightforward.

Furthermore, the use of AI tools is strictly prohibited, as the committee can detect such content and enforces this rule strictly.

Once you're done with your statements, the next step is to prepare all the required documents.

This is where the actual application work begins. Download the application checklist from the official guidelines and use it to make sure you gather everything that is needed.

5 Prepare and Organize Your Documents

Each document must match the format and requirement laid out by GKS.

These include personal identification documents, academic transcripts, proof of citizenship for both you and your parents, recommendation letters, and more depending on your academic level.

Make sure to organise and arrange the documents in the correct order, especially if you're applying through the embassy track where multiple copies are required.

6 Submit to Korean Embassy or University

Once your documents are complete and properly arranged, you'll submit them either to the Korean Embassy in your home country or to the Korean university you're applying to, depending on your chosen track.

Be sure to track deadlines carefully for each route, as they are different and very strict.

Screening and Interview Process

After submission, the evaluation phase begins. If you applied through the embassy track, the Korean Embassy in your country will screen your documents and conduct interviews with shortlisted candidates.

If you applied through the university track, the university will assess your documents and directly recommend selected candidates to NIIED, which is the Korean government body managing the GKS program.

At this stage, shortlisted names are forwarded for final consideration.

Once the NIIED completes the evaluation, the final results are announced. If your name appears on this list.

From this point, you'll receive further instructions on visa processing, university enrolment, and travel arrangements.

Step 3: Increasing Your Selection Chances

These aren't just "extras"; they're proof of your genuine interest and active engagement in your field.

If you've participated in competitions, joined clubs, volunteered, or taken part in any activity connected to your area of study, it shows initiative and passion.

A professional background related to your major is an even bigger advantage, as it demonstrates practical, real-world experience.

Such a letter should come from someone who can vouch for your skills, character, and potential as a student, highlighting your academic strengths and professional qualities.

A well-written recommendation letter from someone who truly understands your abilities can tip the scales in your favour when applying to a Korean university.

6. Your Personal Statement & Study Plan

Your personal statement and study plan are your golden ticket to securing the GKS scholarship.

They allow you to present yourself as more than just your academic grades, showcasing your personality, ambitions, and the unique qualities that make you a strong candidate.

GKS gives you the opportunity to convince the selection committee of your motivation, your goals, why you have chosen Korea, why you have selected your specific major, and what you plan to do both during your studies and after completing them.

This part of the application is crucial and requires precision.



The interview can feel overwhelming, but it is your golden opportunity to directly convince the committee.


This is your moment to showcase your personality, communicate your motivation, and answer their questions smartly and authentically.

What are the selection chances for GKS, and how tough is the process?

The GKS process is highly competitive, with only about 15% of applicants selected. It is heavily grade-focused, but grades aren't the only factor that matters.

Many applicants have been selected despite not having top-tier marks simply because they submitted a strong personal statement and a well-aligned study plan and performed well in the interview.

What are the main evaluation criteria and preferences in GKS selection?

The main evaluation points for GKS include both document screening and interviews. Here's how it works:

1. The selection committee examines your documents to verify your citizenship, education level, and academic grades to determine whether you are qualified for the programme and the major you selected.

- 2. You will also be assessed on your overall competency, which includes both your submitted documents and your interview performance.
- 3. If you have a TOPIK Level 3 or above, you receive an additional 10% in your evaluation score.
- 4. If you are a descendant of a Korean War veteran who served in the war through a foreign military, you are awarded an additional 5%.
- 5. If you do not submit a language proficiency certificate, then your personal statement and study plan become crucial evaluation components.

Evaluation Preferences for GKS Applicants

In addition to the standard screening and interviews, the GKS selection process includes preference-based evaluation. Here's who gets priority:

- 1. Overseas Koreans are given the highest preference.
- 2. Applicants from low-income families or underprivileged backgrounds come next.
- 3. Those applying to Natural Science and Engineering majors at regional universities (Type B) are prioritised.
- 4. Current academic professors applying to Natural Science and Engineering fields are also preferred.
- 5. Applicants with strong English or Korean proficiency certificates receive additional consideration.
- 6. Postdoctoral research applicants in the Natural Science and Engineering fields are favoured too.

This preference system helps the committee choose candidates who align with the long-term goals of the scholarship, bridging academic, cultural, and professional growth across borders.
